



From Father Robert Dear Friends

I write this a week before I head off for the 'bonnie, bonnie, banks of Loch Lomond'. Every time I mention it

to someone they say, first, "oh, it's beautiful there". Then secondly, the well-wisher mutates into Moses before Pharaoh, and begins to warn me of plagues of midges. The twofold declarations sum up nicely the double-edged nature of the holiday which will include the scattering of my mother's ashes.

To return to the first comment, I am looking forward to re-visiting a place that formed the backdrop to almost every holiday we had for the first 15 years of my life. Already, rather patchy memories are stirring, but nowhere in these recollections is the reminder of the impending plague. (Do children simply not notice these things, like the cold, or is it simply my brain has redacted these wee munching nuisances from its banks?)

Church life, and particularly our worshipping life is saturated with memory. One of the very few 'direct' commandments of Jesus was, "do this in remembrance of me". For our spiritual forebears, the pinnacle of their year is an act of remembrance, the Passover.

Given the thrust of so much of life today demands looking to the future, what tomorrow brings and so on, there feels to be a dichotomy in these two human instincts. Yet, the Church has always looked forwards as well as backwards. There has always been an understanding that the future is often formed by what has gone before.

The significance of both Passover and the Eucharist is to make those past experiences a present reality, and so our life as the people of God is transformed as well as transformative.

We are hopefully entering a 'new' future even though COVID is still an everpresent unwanted neighbour. As we rest over the next few weeks we will have to look, as a church, to our future. We will have to continue to re-discover things loved and lost, and look once again to our Mission in Hanwell and Beyond.

Like me I hope you have a restful and peaceful few weeks, and I hope yours are also midge-free!

Which charities should we support in 2022?

There are about seventy people enrolled at St Thomas' in our various planned giving schemes — weekly envelopes, standing order, and Parish Giving Scheme. Although it is

not often publicised, we have a very healthy tradition of setting aside 10% of the total congregational giving received each year from these seventy 'Stewards'. This money is earmarked for the purpose of making charitable donations.

The charities that we support include organisations that operate locally, or just in the UK, and those that operate internationally. We support organisations that are concerned with relief and development work, as well as those with a specific focus on Christian mission and outreach.

During 2021, the total Stewardship giving was £40,448. This means that £4,044 has been earmarked for the Parish's charitable giving during 2022. Some money has already been given to support relief work needed as a consequence of the war in Ukraine. However, we have yet to decide how to distribute the remaining funds, and would welcome suggestions from 'Trident' readers. Apart from larger charities that may be well known, we are always interested to learn about smaller charities, especially those operating in West London.

The Oberammergau Passion Play

I have just returned from this. It's not just a play, it's an experience, enhanced if you are religiously inclined.

My tour party of 36 had a dual base. Saturday through to Wednesday evening was based in Koblenz, a beautiful city. From there, trips to Cochem, Rudesheim, St Goar via a Rhine cruise, Trier and Heidleburg, prior to arriving in our second base in Garmisch-Partenkirchen, 15 minutes from Oberammergau. All these cities have so much history. Many churches, castles and places of learning survive in part or in total from several hundred years ago. Many of those partially destroyed by Germanic rivals, French or British, have been sympathetically restored. I recommend all of these places as being worthwhile, but the focus of this article is the last day.

We arrived late morning. Free time to see the main church, the museum and lunch prior to the play. The tour party was a mixture of United Reform, Catholic and C of E, with around 50% being a party from Dorset. The small town has approximately 5500 residents; a significant number participate.

Historical summary:

Plague during the 30 years war swept across Europe in the first half of the 17th.Century. 84 villagers died in 1633. Their family and friends prayed to God, vowing to put on the Passion of Jesus every 10 years, should they be spared any more plague deaths. Supposedly, they were. They kept their promise one year later, initially a one off performance. The first few years' audiences comprised the villagers who weren't involved, then the word spread to neighbouring villages, and further. It is difficult to cover nearly 400 years concisely...

1662 The oldest surviving text.

1680 switched to every 10 years, usually on the turn of the decade.

1770 Banned by Elector Maximilian 111. "No place for the greatest secret of our holy religion". 1780 1790 1800 Oberammergau was exempted from

the Bavarian ban on passion plays.

1880 - 1910 Attendance increasing every decade. Now have kings, queens, composers, religious leaders, presidents, future popes and Thomas Cook, who made train travel from England viable. 56 shows, 224,000 attend.

1920 Delayed until 1922 due to WW1 and Spanish flu.

1930 A new stage. and now 5,200 seats.

1934 Special 300th anniversary show. Hitler attended. Under strong Nazi pressure, they were forced to make it anti-Semitic.

1940 The second cancellation.

1950 onwards: the script frequently revised to make it more inclusive, less controversial.

2000 Non Christians allowed to take part for the first time, and some Muslim villagers did. 1600 adults and 550 children put on 110 shows for 520,000 people.

The quality of the singing, the music, the sound, was superb. It is performed in German, with a booklet translation of everything. Made me reappraise figures such as Pilate and Caiaphas.

I should tell you that it's no sprint. 2.30pm - 5pm. Then a 3h break for dinner. back on stage 8pm, finishing 10.45pm. However, it never dragged!

This year, it's on 5 days a week, from 14th. May until 2nd. October.

Thank you, but the foodbank has plenty of: meat & meat main meals, and pasta at the moment.


