



I, like many, was shocked to receive the news of the Queen's passing. The events that followed reinforced

the sense of loss. Added to this the strange and moving use of "King", after what is for me a life-time of "Queen", amplified the profundity of the time. Running through the extreme emotions of the community and nation was an increased awareness of St Thomas' unusual status.

Throughout the period of mourning I stressed how we, of all places, should observe the solemnity of the moment, as we have 'The Crown' as our 'patron'. I had always referred to the Queen as our patron, but until the time after her death I had never been questioned about it. I therefore assumed everyone knew what it meant. However, I lost track of the times someone asked me about it after Thursday 8<sup>th</sup> September. The most amusing question came couched in a polite enquiry from a person who had heard me use the phrase "our patron" in the past but always put it down to the zealous Royalist proclivities of the vicar!

As the question came I realised what a strange and historic animal the Church of England was. For those who do not know what is meant by the patron, here goes. Historically the land on which churches were built belonged to someone. Usually this was the Church, local land owner or some institution such as an Oxbridge College. The person who allowed the church to be built became its patron and was responsible for appointing the priest and maintaining the church and buildings including the vicarage. Over time the vast majority of patrons sold or gave their patronage to the Diocesan Bishop who then became responsible for the ministry of that place. In the case of St Thomas', the Earl of Jersey (who donated the original plot of land) gave the patronage to the Crown.

This unusual situation means that the vicar is offered the 'living' of the vicarage by the Crown via 10 Downing Street. The Bishop, having agreed with the appointment, gives the priest a license to exercise their ministry in the church.

Needless to say, the impact day-to-day is never noticed, but over the past weeks I have felt a sense of responsibility to exercise our love and care for a family that many of us will never meet. This however, is the Church of England at its best; a 'People's Church'.

Normally the sad reality is that we have long-since ceased to be seen as such. The good old C of E rarely touches people's lives, we are no longer the default option of a form. Yet, the ceremonies and activities of faithful parishes have reminded people of the centrality of faith in this land. I lost track of the number of times commentators referred to the centrality of faith within the Queen's life and work. Like any well integrated faith this belief and observance positively affected those around her.

As a Church we have had the chance to 'be there' for people navigating grief and disorientation. We can do this by the normally anonymous presence of the parish church, of which we are counted. We have the huge privilege of being a part of so many lives, and we must ensure that that continues.

Let us then continue to pray and serve this wonderful community in which God has placed us, be it for 96 days or 96 years.

Please, please invite as many people as possible. Finally, for October, our **Panto Launch** evening is on 15<sup>th</sup> October... Oh yes it is!


In November we will also be marking **Remembrance Sunday** on 13<sup>th</sup> November and this year we welcome back the return of the **Quiz Night**!



### A prayer for King Charles

Everlasting God, we pray for our new King. Bless his reign and the life of our nation. Help us to work together so that truth and justice, harmony and fairness flourish among us; through Jesus Christ our Lord Amen

#### HYMN: The story behind ... O God, our help in ages past

O God, our help in ages past, Our hope for years to come, Our shelter from the stormy blast, And our eternal home!

Under the shadow of Thy throne Still may we dwell secure; Sufficient is Thine arm alone, And our defense is sure...

A thousand ages in Thy sight Are like an evening gone; Short as the watch that ends the night, Before the rising sun.

Isaac Watts (1674 - 1748) is often called the 'Father of English hymnody'. Certainly, before his hymns came along, congregational singing was a tedious business.

Watts was born in July 1674 in Southampton. (At the time of his birth, his father, an educated deacon in a dissenting Congregational church, was briefly in prison for his non-conformist beliefs.) As a boy, Watts showed outstanding ability with language (learning Greek, Hebrew, Latin and French). He also had an unusual ability for easy rhyming in English. (At the age of five, when scolded for giggling in family prayers, it was because he had seen a mouse on the bell-rope, and instantly composed the line: 'There was a mouse, for want of stairs, ran up a rope to say his prayers!')

Watts' literary ability, combined with his interest in theology, made him very unhappy with the congregational singing of the day, which focused almost entirely on strict metrical versions of the psalms. One Sunday after church, Isaac complained to his father about this. His father challenged him to write something better. Though only 18, Watts accepted the challenge, and produced his first hymn – which was duly sung the following Sunday. It was such a success that he wrote new hymn texts every Sunday for the next two years. In all, he went on to write more than 600 hymns. Some of them are still well-loved today: from this one, 'O God, Our Help in Ages Past', which is a paraphrase of Psalm 90, to 'When I Survey the Wondrous Cross', and the Christmas carol 'Joy to the World'.
