From Father Robert Dear Friends

A few weeks ago the Archbishop of Canterbury hosted the Lambeth Conference. This ten yearly event is, ideally

(!), a chance to listen to the experience of fellow bishops throughout the world and learn together.

The sad reality is that it often highlights cultural differences which impact on the interpretation of scripture mainly in the area of human sexuality. The anguish and pain felt over the few days provided the media with lots of juicy red meat. In the end an uneasy truce was struck, and a foreboding sense of seemingly inevitable future fissure permeated the air.

In some respects it is easy to be downhearted, but in doing so we can fail to remember the God who transforms hearts and lives, and often does so, significantly, by using the voices of those beyond our shores.

On 3rd September the Church gives thanks for Pope Gregory the Great. This memorial of the Church is particularly important to us in this land, because it was Gregory who 'persuaded!' a very reluctant Augustine to come to these shores. From the stories of the time it seems that Augustine offered all sorts of excuses from needing to concentrate on his current work to washing his hair. Well ok, perhaps not washing his hair, but Augustine viewed, like almost everyone else, a mission to 'the Angles' as being utterly pointless. This view was probably not helped by Pope Gregory's rationale for the mission, his belief that the blond English slaves in the market in Rome looked like angels. Not the sort of 'start-up' to pitch to the *Dragon's Den*.

In the end, thankfully, Gregory's curious *Mission Action Plan* was fulfilled and Augustine came to this land and so transformed the history of England. Lambeth, it seems, dealt with far weightier and certainly better researched missionary objectives, so we would do well to move to a place of prayer and pray earnestly. Who knows what the future will look like, but what we do know is that it will be one where God is present.

My prayer for us as the new academic year begins is that, like Gregory, we will see the divine even in the most unlikely of faces and situations.

Please invite as many people as possible.


Again, can I just say huge thank you all who have helped out in so many practical ways over the summer.

ST THOMAS' FAMILY EVENTS





The Parochial Church Council (PCC) met on Tuesday 19th July. Here is a brief summary of matters that we discussed.

Common Fund Offer for 2023

First some explanation. All parishes in the London Diocese contribute to what is known as the 'Common Fund', so called because it reflects the common mission of our Diocese. The Common Fund finances such things as clergy stipends (our vicar's salary), clergy housing, training of new clergy, and ministry with young people in schools and colleges.

Our contribution to the Common Fund is not imposed upon us: parishes are asked to contribute generously, according to their resources. Our 'Common Fund' payment is by far and away our biggest expense — this year it is £63,600, paid by monthly instalments. Large though this may be, it does not represent our full cost to the Diocese which is £85,200. The difference is made up from the generous contributions of parishes more wealthy than ourselves, that contribute more than their cost. We also continue to benefit from some of the historic wealth of the London Diocese. We are extremely thankful for this support, without which we would not have a parish priest of our own. Contrary to what some may think, the Church of England does not receive any support from the Government!

After much discussion, the PCC agreed to offer an increased contribution of £66,000 for 2023, on the basis of prospective increases in stewardship giving and hall hire income as we begin to build back after lockdown. This is as much as we can realistically afford without exceeding our anticipated income. Next year, it will cost to the Diocese a budgeted £87,775 to fund St Thomas' ministry. Therefore, in 2023 we will be contributing to the Common Fund at a rate of just over 75% of our actual cost.

Buildings Update — The Church

An asbestos survey of the interior has been carried out and we are awaiting the report. This is a necessary prelude to carrying out repairs on some of the interior plasterwork. It is possible that we may be able to obtain grant funding

for this, and for some of the other items that also need repair, for example, the fraying carpet. This will be looked into by the Fabric Committee, who will discuss priorities.

Buildings Update — The Church Hall

A quantity survey has been carried out by a consultant. Arising from this, there is at least a 5 year programme of restoration and improvement tasks in prospect, some being more urgent than others. Immediate priorities are the broken window in the lounge, together with the stage electrics and entrance canopy, both of which are in a poor state. The Fabric Committee will need to meet to decide how to proceed. Maintenance of the Church Hall is very important for all the community groups that use it.

COVID Measures Update

Chalice administration is working well, with about two-thirds of the congregation having returned to receiving communion in both kinds. We will shortly be reinstating the offertory procession (bread and wine) but not the cash collection. For those wishing to give cash, or hand in planned giving envelopes, there will continue to be a collecting plate positioned just inside the main church entrance.

Other News

- We discussed the idea of having a themed Sunday in support of Arabspeaking Christians in Palestine, with a Zoom presentation and discussion following Mass.
- There is a program in hand to improve the existing lighting along the church path, by replacing the existing lamps with LED units, fitted in the same position. An added benefit will be reduced power consumption, thus lowering our carbon footprint.
- All members of the PCC were encouraged to undertake the Safeguarding Training basic awareness course. Certain church officers being asked to undertake more advanced training.
- We have gratefully received grant funding from Ealing Deanery Synod to provide a new noticeboard outside the Hall.



What we now collect:



Pringles Tubes

Please recycle the plastic lids yourself but put the tube with the metal base in the box. **Remember they don't want the plastic lid!**

Bread


