The Vicar's Letter, 'oh no it isn't...'

Dear Friends

On 13th July 2010 at lunch-time (approximately 1pm) I was asked the following question:

"How do you feel about Pantomimes?" I think I offered some non-committal answer involving having

no theological objections to people and churches doing them. Little did I imagine that I would end up looking like this (see picture)!

I must confess that prior to the experience of the past couple of weeks the **whole 'panto-thing' was a little lost on me. As a child I attended a church** which prided itself on putting on a panto. Yet, as a member of a youth group, this precluded others and me from being anything more than 37th villager on the left. This experience of exclusion, and the sight of people in their 70s playing Cinders and the Prince, re-enforced the sense of **'not getting it'.** Yet you now have a convert who does 'get it'.

I have no desire to tread the Church Hall boards again, but rather a sense that this was the church and its people at their best.

We had all sorts of people come and help get the show on the road; some regular communicants, others people in the community who simply care and enjoy the experience. We have the most amazing young people in any

church. Yes they're talented, yes, they're bright, but, as your priest, it was the way they cared for and supported each other that spoke volumes. You could not have got anything further removed from the frustrated back-stabbing 'lovey' if you tried. **From 7 to 17 they shared the experience** together, and have much to teach the wider church beyond Hanwell.

Perhaps, bizarrely, it was not the show itself that will leave the strongest impression, but the chance to sit with these amazing people young, and not so young, over a baked potato, or bowl of pasta.

So forgive the narrow focus of this **month's letter, but I needed to officially** say a huge, huge thank you all who came on board, in big and small ways, to put on Beauty and the Beast. And thank you for **this priest's conversion.**

St Thomas' Players treated the audience to a rip-roaring rendition of Beauty and the Beast during a packed matinee performance on 11 January.

The panto had it all: humour accessible to all ages, imaginative stage production, great music and even a **talking dog in the form of Roger Grange's Felix the poodle** whose hilarious narration kept things ticking

along wonderfully.

There were assured performances across the cast; Joe Gilbert's seamless transition from Prince to Beast (and back again) was ably complemented by Sarah Baigent's Beauty, backed up by strong supporting roles of Jacques and Capucine played by Hugo Carotenuto and Saul Gilbert.

Father Robert's Ma was a hoot, with Sarah Chapman's Malabelle a suitably sinister baddy for everyone to hiss and jeer at. The younger cast members included a merry band of assorted furniture including a table, rug and **speaking clock.** This might sound barmy to anyone who didn't get to see the panto but it worked a treat.

Audience participation was actively encouraged, from the traditional 'oh no you don't' to a specially adapted Beauty-themed version of 'Hey Jude' by the Beatles.

The Char Ladies were endearing, and treated the audience to a hilarious routine and song at the beginning of the second half.

It is sometimes hard to imagine the hours invested in such a production and as well as the actors it was clear many others had been involved. Everyone had their part to play in ensuring the audience left on a high: from the set designers, props and costumes team, lighting and stage crew, to Keith Spillett's band which provided the musical backdrop to the show. The whole thing was brought together with excellent direction from Chris Michell and choreography from Caroline Shea.

St Thomas' Players pulled this panto off with aplomb and gave everyone a boost just when they might have been suffering from the post Christmas January blues. Surely there will be demand for another play soon after such a triumphant performance?

A Boston Manor Resident

Having volunteered to collect the BMRA's annual subscription, I found myself doing some door to door and had the unexpected pleasure, one afternoon, to meet a charming elderly lady.

She told me, standing there at her front door on a blustery day, that she was 103 years old. At first I did not believe her. But when she confirmed that indeed that was that age I had to concede that indeed she was 103. She was beautiful ; white hair of course, earrings, necklaces, neatly dressed and a twinkle in her eye. I simply wanted to get to know her better and found out a little bit more about her. Indeed, I thought at the time that perhaps I **could write a paragraph about her for the next edition of the BMRA's newsletter.** So another day I went back to have a chat. This could not easily be arranged because firstly she was going on holiday and secondly she was very busy.

Anyhow, we did meet on the day of the storm and chatted amiably. She moved to her present house in 1958. As we know, some houses in W13 and W7 are nearing £700 000 now but, at the time, her husband purchased her home for less than £5000. The traffic was quite different then. The Harvester Pub, then known as « The Royal », did have a wonderful green space behind it. Also, tennis courts and a small pavilion were situated in the present Haslemere Nature Reserve and used by the local schools, including Walpole grammar school. In later years it provided a sanctuary for numerous birds – now gone. She thinks the many magpies steal their eggs. She is desolate about it as we all are! Boston Manor parade had a butcher, a wonderful hardware shop, a shoe-repairer, a Post Office/chemist and a hairdresser. There was no operative cleaning the street once a week.

The lady is devoted to her family of children and grand-children and they are her life now as all her friends and previous neighbours have passed away. She used to attend St Thomas of the Apostle and still contributes to the church upkeep when there is an appeal

Knowing she has had one daughter and one son I asked if she simply stayed at home to bring them up or if she, at some point, had worked. She told me that before moving to the Boston Manor area she had lived with her husband and mother in law in Hounslow West. Her husband was a journalist for the Times Newspaper. When they came to their present

house, her mother in law, who was a wonderful cook and looked after the children after school, came as well. So at first the lady started a part-time secretarial job and then the company she worked for asked her to go full-time. Which she did. Her employer used to get her picked up in the morning with a Jaguar and dropped back home in a Bentley!!

This lady now cooks simple meals for herself, never sits down during the morning (too much to do !!) and her house is impeccable. Spotting a baby grand piano I also discovered that she loved music including traditional jazz. Happily, her children are involved with music which is a great joy for her. She has five grand-children and four great-grand children.

You won't bump into her of course but you will be glad to know that such a wonderful and happy person lives in your neighbourhood.

50 years ago:- on 7th Feb 1964 that The Beatles arrived in New York City for their first tour of the USA, and were met by thousands of screaming fans.

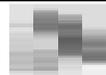

Fair Trade Fortnight goes bananas....

Fair Trade Fortnight this year (24 Feb – 9 Mar) will see the launch of a new campaign to increase the sales of Fair Trade bananas. Although more than 1.2 billion Fairtrade bananas are now sold in the UK each year, that is still only one in three of the bananas sold.

So 'Abolish the Unfair Banana' aims to carry on transforming the banana industry, in order to ensure that those at the sharp end of the supply chain – the millions of struggling banana farmers – get a fair deal. The campaign is the next part of Fair Trade's three year initiative to Make Food Fair.

News from the Brownies

2014 is a very special year for Brownies. We are celebrating our centenary. It was in 1914 that the younger sisters of Girl Guides wanted to join in all the fun. So it was agreed that girls aged between 8 and 11 could join and a special group was formed. They were called Rosebuds because little buds would one day grow into beautiful roses. They wore a blue uniform just like the older girls. The girls did not like the name Rosebuds and so in 1915 their name was changed to Brownies and they began to wear a brown uniform. This name was chosen by Lord Baden-Powell, the founder of Scouting, as he had heard of stories of little people doing special helpful jobs and being kind to other. This name is now well known and used in many countries around the world.
