




From our Vicar
Dear Friends

A few months ago I had a sermon published in a book by SCM, 'Preaching a Radical Orthodoxy: Sermons for the Christian Year'. The sermon was on one of the subjects I struggle

most with, angels, and the feast of St Michael and All Angels falls in September.

What I reflected upon was why books on the subject are so popular, and what is the Christian response. These were just some of the titles: The Angel Bible, Messages from Angels, The Healing of Angels, How to Change Your World with Angels and even, wait for it, Angel Horses: Divine Messengers of Hope by Linda Anderson.

It's no wonder that the preacher looks forward to this subject about as much as an evening in with all 256 pages of Ms Anderson's angelic equine tome. But the trouble is that as a Church we can't really avoid the issue of Angels and Archangels. At every Eucharist we declare our solidarity and participation in worship with Angels and Archangels and all the company of heaven, before joining their song: the Sanctus.

This scriptural declaration within the context of the Eucharist means that we simply cannot dismiss the angelic as mere divine Postman Pats. Yes, as their Greek name suggests, they are messengers, but as scripture shows they are so much more. Angels according to the Psalmist (Ps. 148.2, 5) are a part of creation, yet they also have authority over the created order. Angels crop up everywhere in the bible, whether it's scrapping in the middle of the road with Jacob, feeding a depressed Elijah, or telling shepherds of

Christ's birth. Yet in spite of the accepted presence within scripture what is their point after Christ's life; the Word made flesh?

I'm not sure they have to have a point that fits into our scheme. When we attempt to do this we not only run into all sorts of issues scientific and philosophical about the truth of them, but we diminish the mystery and also the vision of the world created by God. By trying to fit the angelic into a role, a being or a job description that we can label and file, we commodify God's creation.

Angels reveal to us more than breaking news from the Almighty, they reveal a fullness to God's creation which takes us beyond the cave in which mankind dwells if you're Plato or the Shadowlands if you're C. S. Lewis. This season and feast, as we grapple with the bewildering world of Angels, we are shown a glimpse of the real world created by God in his inexhaustible, overflowing love. They may seem to be no more than winged silhouettes on our cave, but they give us a fuller framework for the universe.

This real world, *kosmos*, exists within the life of God and we are caught up and welcomed into it.

In the end we can be scriptural, hopeful, faithful, and 'sensible', because we live within the life of God. So may God reach out to you this season in whatever angelic form his word takes.

A Call is for Life

It's with great delight that I am working as a priest back in the Church of England on placement at St Thomas'. Since I was ordained in 2000 at Rochester Cathedral by Bishop Michael Nazi Ali I have had a curious journey of serving Christ in this new century.

After training at St John's Nottingham, I ministered as a curate in Snodland (industrial Kent) and then was the priest in charge of two rural parishes in Nottinghamshire, where tradition (and mission) still hold firm. After five years of this I moved to north Nottinghamshire - Sutton in Ashfield - and was priest at an Anglo Catholic Church - St Mary Magdalene. All this was good but then sometimes things happen in life that you don't plan for or predict. My whole family became Roman Catholic and I felt I needed to join them in worshipping at the Catholic Church. This of course meant putting the mantle of my priesthood down for a time.

Whilst I found work with the Catholic Diocese in adult education I found my call as a priest never left me. My experience is that ordination changed me. I was meant to be a priest and spread the Gospel and found it was painful not to do it. But as the Roman Catholic Church doesn't recognise women priests I was in a conundrum until I had a chance meeting with a hermit nun in Norfolk.

She recognised the call straight away and said I needed to offer it back to the Church of England with the understanding that they may or may not take it up again. As luck (or God's providence) had it Bishop Pete opened the door and welcomed me back in.

So I have landed in St Thomas' Hanwell, to exercise my priestly ministry with you all for a time. The spiritual life is an interior journey of becoming ever closer to God and doing His will so I am looking forward to being with you in the presence of Christ.

From earliest times, he was regarded as the author of the first of the four Gospels. The Gospel of Matthew is in correct, concise style, very suitable for public reading.

His usual emblem as an evangelist is a man, because his genealogy emphasised the family ties of Christ. In art, he has been represented as either an evangelist or as an apostle. As an evangelist, he has been depicted sitting at a desk, writing his gospel with an angel holding the inkwell. In the Middle Ages he was even given a pair of spectacles.

Matthew was martyred by a sword or a spear, some think in Ethiopia.

What an apple might do for you

Here's some good news: an apple a day could help keep diabetes at bay, according to new health guidelines.

Yoghurt, cheese and regular cups of tea or coffee are among other food and drinks that could also help ward off the condition. But keep an eye on the meat and potatoes — they may actually increase your likelihood of diagnosis.

The dietary advice comes from Oxford University and Diabetes UK. It also suggests eating more wholegrains and fruit and vegetables.

Best way to clean your house

The most efficient way to clean your house is to tackle it chore by chore, not room by room.

Dusting, vacuuming, and tidying room by room wastes time, according to the Good Housekeeping Institute (GHI). Instead, once the duster is out, go over the whole house with it. Follow the same procedure with the vacuum cleaner, mop, dustpan and brush, window cleaning gear and other cleaners.

Other good tips: keep a running list of 'groceries to get', put a damp sock on your hand to wipe the dust off blinds, add dishwasher rinse to water to clean windows and leave them streak free.

Keep your brain healthy

Here's an excellent reason to get regular exercise: women who are fit at 50 are five times less likely to get dementia.

A Swedish study found that middle age is the key time for people to take steps to promote their brain health. And boosting your exercise does not have to mean major exertion – just try a brief jog, or a brisk walk with friends. Doctors suggested that the best way to maintain good brain health was to 'eat a balanced diet, maintain a healthy weight, not smoke, and keep blood pressure and cholesterol in check.'

100 years ago, from 26th Sep to 11th Nov that the WW1 Meuse-Argonne Offensive took place in France. It was the last major battle of WW1, and the American Expeditionary Force's largest and bloodiest operation of the war. Allied victory.

90 years ago, on 28th Sep 1928 that the use of cannabis was made illegal in the UK. (Medical use of cannabis was made illegal in 1973.)

80 years ago, on 30th Sep 1938 that British Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain returned to England in triumph after signing the Munich Agreement, declaring there would be 'peace for our time'.

Also 40 years ago, on 17th Sep 1978 that the Camp David Accords were signed in Washington DC by Israel and Egypt. They led to the Egypt-Israel Peace Treaty in 1979.

30 years ago, on 6th Sep 1988 that 11-year-old British boy Thomas Gregory became the youngest person to swim the English Channel.

20 years ago, on 4th Sep 1998 that Google, the internet search company, was founded by Larry Page and Sergey Brin, both students at Stanford **University in California. The company was initially based in a friend's garage** in Menlo Park.

10 years ago, on 7th Sept 2008 that the 2008 Financial Crisis was underway. The troubled US mortgage-financing giants Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac were placed into government conservatorship, under the Federal Housing Finance Agency.
