From our Vicar

Dear Friends

In May the Church throughout the world celebrates its birthday as the Feast of Pentecost is observed. In Sicily rose petals are dropped from the ceiling of the church and in France this feast is marked by the blowing of trumpets.

We too will have our own trumpets blowing very soon as work continues apace on the organ refurbishment. The original target for the Organ was around £150,000 and what seemed at times like a distant hope is becoming a reality. This reality is largely thanks to the vision and kindness of a parishioner who bequeathed part of her estate especially for the organ work.

Miss Edna Cooper (pictured) was an important part of our parish life, and served the wider community as a music teacher so the fulfilment of her final wishes has a wonderful sense of appropriateness about it. Her gift of over £100,000 has meant that her own musical legacy will extend to people she never knew and are yet to be born. It ensures that **the rich musical tradition of St Thomas's will**

continue and grow. It is that aspect which is so **important. Edna's gift was not a way of making sure a** piece of furniture is preserved in museum-like aspic, but rather to further the mission and gifts of the church in Hanwell.



It seems to me that this is every inch the spirit of Pentecost that was celebrated in May.

God in his great love for the world sent his divine love, the Holy Spirit, not simply to make us feel warm and spiritually fuzzy, but to equip us to serve the Church and world.

Thus, the gifts of the Holy Spirit are gifts of service. This reality is very **important as we recall our own parish slogan of 'Serving Hanwell and Beyond'.**

As we, in the month of June, approach our Patronal Feast Day in July we would do well to ask the Holy Spirit to come and breathe on us afresh so that we may fulfil our callings.

We may not feel we can offer gifts of the magnitude of Edna, but gifts which transform lives are not bound by finance. All of us have received gifts and all of us are called to share those with the world around us.

So I will repeat the prayer prayed at the end of last month:

Come Holy Spirit and fill the hearts of your people, and kindle in us the fire of your love.

Do please echo that prayer, and do please gift a special prayer of thanks for a lady, filled with the Holy Spirit who has left a gift which will ensure the **Spirit's coming for many years will be accompanied by the sounds of trumpets, horns, wald flutes, contra fagotto, vox angelica, and much more.**

The Venerable Rachel Treweek

The Queen has approved the nomination of the Venerable Rachel Treweek for election as Bishop of Gloucester, in succession to the Right Rev. Michael Perham MA, who retired in November. She will be the most senior female bishop: though there have been 2 female bishops appointed previously, she is the first woman to be appointed a diocesan bishop, as **opposed to a suffragan bishop. Rachel's appointment follows those of Alison White, Bishop of Hull, and Libby Lane, Bishop of Stockport.**

“My overwhelming feeling is one of excitement”, she said of her appointment.

Born Rachel Montgomery, and raised in Herefordshire, Rachel went to Reading University to study linguistics and language pathology. She was a speech and language therapist before being ordained in 1994. She served her title at St George and All Saints, Tufnell Park, then became Vicar of St James the Less, Bethnal Green, in 1999. 2006 saw her appointed Archdeacon of Northolt, and also was the year of her marriage to Guy Treweek, priest-in-charge of 2 parishes in the City of London. It was in her capacity as Archdeacon of Northolt that she offered vital help and **support to David Jewell and myself during St Thomas's interregnum in 2011. She also presided over several of our annual churchwardens' legal swearing-in ceremonies.** In July of 2011 she was appointed Archdeacon of Hackney.

She lists her interests as conflict transformation – she has been a member **of the Bridge Builders' Council of Reference since 2011** – walking, canoeing and chocolate!

Rachel has long been a champion of women's ministry. She has expressed a hope that the appointment of women to such positions as hers in church will now be seen as 'normal'. She says “It is my real hope that from this time on that any child, any adult, will know that they can be the person that God is calling them to be.” As the first female diocesan bishop she will be eligible to join the Lords Spiritual, the bishops of the Church of England who serve in the House of Lords.

The Bishop of London, Richard Chartres, said in March “As Richard of Gloucester is reinterred, Rachel of Gloucester is revealed. While we are very sorry to see her go, Gloucester has appointed someone with real quality and distinction.” Her formal enthronement as bishop of the diocese, home to 600,000 people and 205 parishes, will take place at Gloucester Cathedral later this year.

The Winning Recipe

One of the highlights of our May Fair last month **was the St Thomas's Bake-Off. The Trident's very own Jill Ashcroft won the over-18's category, with her Lemon Drizzle Cake, beating off stiff competition.**



We asked Jill if we could share the recipe, so here it is!

Ingredients

175g butter, softened
175g caster sugar
2 unwaxed lemons
3 large eggs
100g self-raising flour
75g ground almonds
2 tabsp milk
100g demerara sugar

Method

Beat together the butter, caster sugar and the finely grated zest of 1 lemon until light and fluffy. Add a pinch of salt and the eggs, one at a time, beating until well combined before adding the next.

Sift over the flour and fold in, followed by the almonds. Add just enough milk to bring the mixture to a dropping consistency, then spoon into a lined and greased 1lb loaf tin. Smooth the top with the back of a spoon. Bake in a pre-heated oven, 180C/160C fan/gas mark 4, for 50-55 mins until a skewer comes out dry.

Briefly mix together the zest of the remaining lemon and the juice of both the lemons with the demerara sugar. Poke holes all over the top of the warm cake and pour over the drizzle, waiting for the cake to absorb one lot before adding the next.

Allow to cool in the tin before turning out.

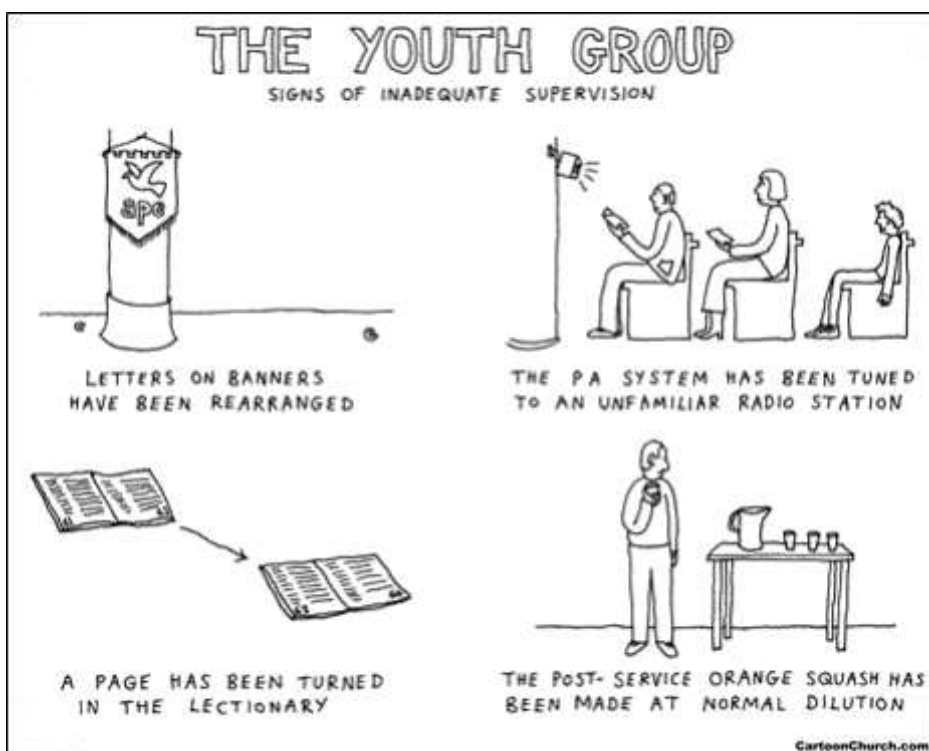
Happy 100th Birthday, dear WI!

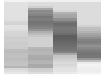
