

From our Vicar

Dear Friends

The merry, merry month of May is awash with Feast Days this year. Traditionally, May was a month with a **special focus on the Virgin Mary, but I fear our Lord's mother may be fighting for billing as we have Ascension Day, Pentecost, Trinity Sunday and Corpus Christi. May is also punctuated on a daily basis, it seems, by saints' days (three of the twelve apostles are celebrated this month!).**

What does all this mean, apart from lots of work for the sacristan who has to keep changing the vestment colours? Well it well and truly marks the end of Easter, because if May is awash with feast days, Eastertide is conspicuous by their absence. Perhaps that is as it should be.

For the 50 days of Easter we have the chance to confront the reality of death as the ultimate common denominator, but May presents us with something different. Rather than death being the ultimate common **denominator, Kierkegaard said 'trouble is the ultimate common denominator of the living, the great equalizer'.** I think he is equally correct because, having all these saints celebrated we meet trouble on an almost daily basis.

Whenever a person is good and kind we say, 'oh isn't he/she a saint!'. The implication is that here is an exemplar of virtue, someone who smooths bumpy roads, and makes straight crooked paths etc. However, delving into the lives of the saints you realise what, in the words of Terry Thomas, a **'complete shower' they were. Any virtue was not won by floating six feet** above trouble, but meeting it head on and grappling with it emotionally and spiritually. Even the Virgin Mary, whose month it is, is sadly caricatured as some other-worldly being who looks constantly unruffled and untarnished, but was in fact an unmarried teenage girl chosen to carry God.

All this reminds me, and encourages me, that hope does not stop when the Easter Garden is packed away for another year, and the Easter Candle **moved from the sanctuary to the font until next year's Easter Day Service.**

No hope, reviled in the lives of very unlikely people, tells us that God is ever-present in our troubles. God never offered immunity from the pressures of the world, just accompaniment and the hope (and reality seen in historic lives) that trouble and pain do not have to have the last word.

I hope you had a 'hopeful' Easter, but I pray that aided by the prayers of Mary, and a troublesome and messy band of holy men and women, that you have a hopeful May as well.

This event was a superb and fitting opening event, which not only celebrated the attributes of organ and organist alike, but also provided a wonderful opportunity to **bring joy and celebrate what is good about St Thomas'.** I wish to thank all those who helped in the technical department, and with catering, but mainly Michael for his inspired choice of performer, and for arranging it. It seems that music will continue to resound in our walls as there is another musical event of a different type happening all day from 10.30am on 21st May. Other big events in May include our hosting of the Archdeacon's Visitation Service. This is an annual service which is held in the deanery and forms the context for the Archdeacon to give his 'charge', and install the various parishes' churchwardens. Given the size of the deanery it only comes to a parish about every 20 years, so it would be great if we could make it as memorable as possible. The service itself begins at 8pm, but there is much to do in terms of catering etc before. Please help if you can.

At the end of April we had our parish's APCM (AGM) and this is a great chance for us to not only elect our representatives, but celebrate our life together. I would like to thank all those who are serving in different ways in the parish, and re-iterate how much it means to me as vicar, and to the wider community.

With the wider community in mind April also saw our Fun Run which is turning out to be a fabulous way of engaging people who do not normally come our way. A big thank you goes to Sarah Holroyd, Sue Cunningham and their happy band of helpers!

Staying with the community aspect, last month saw a huge amount of **work being done on St Thomas' Garden. This exciting project is**


developing the green space around the sides and back of the church so that it can be used by many different groups. Thanks go to Leanda and the PCC for all their efforts in making this happen.

LONDON AIR AMBULANCE

The Brownies are currently working on a project and badge about the London Air Ambulance. There are several clauses involved in the badge including finding out and visiting places in London , learning a bit about helicopters and also First Aid - most of the Brownies have been awarded their First Aid Badge. We have had a visitor from the 999 service to talk to us about the London Air Ambulance and how it is the only branch of the Emergency Services that is paid for entirely by voluntary contributions and is not included in the NHS budget. London currently has 1 air ambulance to cover the whole of the area. They have raised money for a second helicopter and are now working towards fitting it up with all the necessary equipment so even more lives can be saved.

The Brownies will be telling you a bit about what they have been doing at the end of our Pentecost Parade Service on Sunday May 15th. After the service we will be having a retiring collection to support the London Air Ambulance Service. We hope you will be able to donate something towards this most important cause

Ode to Joan Harle

A life long member of St Thomas' and supporter of the Girl Guide movement.

“She made me feel like a princess for the day.”

My first recollection of meeting Joan Harle took place at the gates of St Thomas' church in the seventies, when as a stressed and over anxious young mum, I off-loaded two of my children into her loving care for Sunday School. As I thanked her and tried to beat a hasty retreat, promising to collect them at said appointed time, Joan asked

‘Why don’t you stay for church?’

I mumbled some excuse about not being appropriately dressed, to which Joan replied

‘Just button up your coat, no one will be the wiser.’

I managed to persuade her I had to go back home. However, I did return later for Evensong.

We had recently moved into the area, but knew from experience that the teachings of the church from an early age was important for young minds.

Some time later, I decided to join St Mark’s church, and of course the children went with me. However, someone was so concerned about our moonlight flit, that it was brought to the attention of Miss Julian (a very active church stalwart) who then contacted me to ask the reason for our departure. I assured her our leaving had no bearing on the Sunday School or the teachers.

St Mark’s church closed in 1978-79 and so I returned to St Thomas’. You could have knocked me down with a feather – the first person I saw was Joan Harle! I hurried up to her and exclaimed

“I know you. You were the first person to receive my children into St Thomas’ Sunday School.’ Joan smiled and said hello.

Over the years Joan and I would exchange pleasantries. We attended away quiet days, met at the Communion table, garden parties, flower shows, fetes, Christian Aid walks, a wedding and went on Sunday School outings and generally shared our commitment of church life.

Then one day, Joan came up to me and said

'Eileen, I've been watching the way you share your car with others, would you like to go to tea?'. I thanked her and we arranged to meet at Boston Manor Station to travel up to Central London.

We arrived at our destination, which was my eye-popping wow moment, for we were going to have tea at Fortnum and Mason. As we took our seat, Joan ordered afternoon tea for two, then she stopped in mid sentence saying

'you can have whatever you like.' I reassured her that what she had ordered would suffice. We had a delicious tea. I offered to 'go Dutch' but Joan was emphatic that she would pay. THAT DAY, JOAN HARLE MADE ME FEEL LIKE A PRINCESS.

As the years took their toll on Joan, it was her turn to be taken home in the car and it was an honour to do so. We had a few hilarious moments on our way home trying to put the world to rights, and glaring at motorists who had the temerity to cross us. I was the recipient of sweetmeats, bookmarks, and even a washing-up brush courtesy of Joan. Joan Harle gave me a glimpse of what true discipleship means, and in the words of a **childrens' hymn (by W. St Hill Bourne), Joan certainly kept her promise made at the font.**

I think she will take up her stance at the gates of paradise, gently elbowing St Peter out of the way.
